ATTENDANCE

We would like to bring your attention to attendance and punctuality.

As a school, we expect a minimum of 95% attendance, to enable the children to make good progress both academically and socially. <u>Good attendance at school is not just beneficial it is essential.</u>

We review patterns of absence on a weekly basis. If your child is absent, we may ask you to supply a form of medical evidence (doctors note / medical card or copy of the prescription) for our attendance records. There are, of course, always exceptional circumstances, including long term illness and bereavement, and we will continue to take these into consideration on a case by case basis.

Lateness

Did you know that being 15 minutes late each day is the same as missing two weeks of school over the year? Lateness is just as serious as non-attendance. The start of the school day is an important time for children to develop their social skills with their peers, as well as preparing them for their learning. We start our school day at 8.40 am. Our school gate is opened from 8.30am and the whistle is blown at 8.40 am in order to settle children for teaching to begin at 8.50 am.

Again - we do understand that there are sometimes reasons as to why a child may be late but all children, where possible, need to arrive on time via the playground entrance. Lateness not only affects the individual child—is also has an impact on the other children in class.

CLASS UPDATES:

<u>ROSEN</u>

In RE lessons in Rosen Class, we have been learning about the long journey Mary and Joseph took to get to Bethlehem. We made maps of the journey, recreated the road to Bethlehem using our bricks and small world characters, prayed together about the things we are struggling with on our own journeys, and learnt all about donkeys and how to care for them.

We also made our own Bethlehem scene. We painted buildings around the edge and lit up the inside using fairy lights.



<u>SEACOLE</u>

Seacole Class have had a really busy term. Over the past few weeks, they have been preparing for the KS1 Nativity. Being the eldest children in KS1, the Year 2 children have had to learn all their words for the play as well as all of the song words, and put their acting skills into practice.

We have also had lots of visitors. We had a visit from the dentist who talked to the children about the correct ways to keep our teeth (and our mouth) clean and healthy. She even gave all the children new toothbrushes and a 2 minute timer as well as a story book. We also had a visit from the fire service who talked to the children about fire safety around the home. The children learnt so much! They all went home to check if they had enough smoke detectors, and had a number that parents could call if they wanted one for free.

With all this going on, the children in Seacole Class have also been enjoying gymnastics during our PE sessions, and learning about where we live in our Geography sessions.







RASHFORD

This term in Rashford class, we have been learning about keeping our bodies healthy. We set up an experiment to see how different liquids affect our teeth and what happens if we don't brush our teeth. We used an egg to represent the teeth and enamel. We soaked the egg in water, fizzy drinks, coffee and vinegar for three days. As predicted, nothing really happened to the egg in water suggesting it does not damage our teeth. The fizzy drink and coffee stained the egg. The the which was soaked vinegar. shell dissolved in egg in The vinegar represents the acids that are made by plague bacteria, which cause tooth decay and cavities. Both eggshells and teeth can be weakened by acid, which is why good dental hygiene is so important.






THUNBERG:

The Autumn Term has been and gone in the blink of an eye for our new Thunbergers!

Tremendous efforts have been made fostering the new routines of 'Morning Work' as well as daily times tables practice. A significant highlight for the year 5 complement has to be our swimming instruction, which concluded a couplee of weeks ago. Fantastic progress was made by all – swimmers and non-swimmers alike. While this has been happening, the year 4s have worked alongside their guest teachers of Miss Harding and Mrs Balfour, who have been significantly impressed by their times tables knowledge. Good job, folks!

A big highlight for this term must be our science work, where we've been exploring forces and famous scientists that have hypothesised said forces. One of these scientists was Galileo, who used the idea of push and pulls to create pendulums to measure time. We explored this by changing variables such as bigger/smaller pendulums, different pieces of string and longer/shorter pieces of string.





ORMROD:

This term, Ormrod Class has had a very exciting start to the year from moving classrooms, to welcoming Ameia back. Ormrod have been given the challenge of lots of responsibilities such as our house captains assisting in our Friday Assemblies and our prefects helping hugely across the school. Across this term all children have worked incredibly hard and should be very proud of their achievements.

In Autumn term one, we learnt about Rivers, focusing on the upper, middle and lower course, and finding the features of each section of the river. Additionally, we looked at a range of different rivers from across the world and compared rivers including the river Plym, Mississippi River and the Danube River. During the term, we also looked at a range of writing from fairy tales and creating our own to adventure stories.

In Autumn term two, Ormrod Class have focused on the British Heros, researching Lord Robert Baden Powell, using their problem-solving skills to improve hospital conditions in the 1800s, like Florence Nightingale, and creating motivational speeches about issues they care about just like William Wilberforce. We linked our topic to our reading and writing this term by reading the book Lightning Mary and reading all about the life of Mary Anning. From that, we have been able to create our own non-chronological reports and have also written a story based off true events.




PUPIL CHAPLAINS:
