ATTENDANCE

At St. Peter's we continue to improve our school for all children and as well as them coming fully equipped and in the correct uniform; we would like to raise your attention to attendance and punctuality.

As a school, we expect a minimum of 95% attendance, to enable the children to make good progress both academically and socially. <u>Good attendance at school is not just beneficial it is essential</u>

If your child is absent, we may ask for you to supply a form of medical evidence (doctors note / medical card or copy of the prescription) to support this illness. We will also be reviewing the patterns of absence where appropriate. The Educational Welfare Officer visits our school monthly to inspect every child's attendance. If medical evidence is not provided, the absence will be unauthorised and if there are more than 8 sessions of unauthorised absences, this could result in the EWO being notified.

There are always exceptional circumstances, including long term illness and bereavement, and we will continue to take these into consideration on a case by case basis.

Lateness:

Did you know that being 15 minutes late each day is the same as missing two weeks of school over the year. Lateness is just as serious as non-attendance and could also lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice. The start of the school day is an important time for children to develop their social skills with their peers, as well as preparing them for their learning. We start our school day at 8.50 am; our school gate is opened from 8.30am, the whistle is blown at 8.40 am in order to settle children for teaching to begin at 8.50 am.

Again - we do understand that there are reasons as to why a child may be late but all children, where possible need to arrive on time from the playground entrance as lateness does have an impact on the other children in class. Many thanks for your support with both attendance and punctuality.



PARKING

It is clear from many conversations on the gate that parking is a real source of frustration and concern for many parents. We appreciate that not having the use of a car park, or a place to stop to drop-off or collect your children, causes issues for you. However - for the safety of your children - **please do not park on the pavement or wait in the road**. Parking on the pavement forces families, sometimes with pushchairs, out into the road and this is very dangerous.

We would ask that if there is not a place to park outside school that you park nearby and walk back. Alternatively, you could circle around and try again a few minutes later. <u>Please do not park on the pavement</u>. Thank you very much to our families who are following these rules to help keep everyone safe.

STAFFING

We have welcomed back Mrs Bishop to our Assisi class in November, everyone is pleased to see her! A big thank you to Mrs Drew who has been teaching in the class; we are very grateful to her for her contribution to the school as a teacher and colleague. We also welcome Miss Watson, our new Teaching Assistant; she will be working in Romero class from January 2023.

CLASS UPDATES:-

<u>ASSISI</u>:

In Assisi Class this term, we have enjoyed exploring and learning about the traditional tales of The Gingerbread Man, The Three Little Pigs and The Three Billy Goats Gruff. We have worked hard on using the sounds we are learning to write about these stories. In Science, we have explored our senses through different experiments and talked about which body parts they belong to. In Maths, we have learnt about 2D and 3D shapes, addition and subtraction within 10 and more and less number stories. We have also enjoyed practicing and performing our Christmas play The Big Little Nativity. Lots more learning to be had next term...



NIGHTINGALE:

This term Nightingale class have been working on a design technology project in which the children designed and then made a Christmas puppet. The children have had to learn new skills that helped join materials together. They worked on treading needles and a simple sewing technique called a running stitch. The children loved designing which character puppet they were going to make and were thrilled when they saw these designs coming to life. The children offered each other constructive criticism and were able to alter designs if needed. This last week the classroom has been a busy place to be with puppets being finished and the final pieces put together. Great work Nightingales.





ROMERO:

This term, Romero class enjoyed learning about Judaism. As well as learning from Deborah, our Jewish visitor to school, we were also lucky to visit Plymouth Synagogue in the centre of Plymouth.





THUNBERG:

It has been another busy term in Thunberg class and we all can't believe it's December already!

We've been especially busy learning about King Henry VIII and his conquest to remove all traces of Catholicism during his reign; we've been building on our geographical knowledge of human and physical geography as we've explored different parts of the European continent of Eurasia; and developed our scientific knowledge of rocks and living things, as we've explored the three types of rock (igneous, metamorphic, sedimentary) and how we can classify living organisms using a dichotomy (die-cot-oh-me) diagram like the famous botanist Carl Linnaeus.



A special well done to Rhys 'The Rock Hero' Thunberger, whom became our second 'Rock Hero' on Times Tables Rock Stars this year. What an achievement!

ORMROD:

Ormrod's focus for Autumn Term 1 was Victorians. We specifically focussed on the lives of Victorian children, allowing us to empathise with their experiences and the contrasts between our lives and theirs.

Our topic for Autumn Term 2 has been Earthquakes. We have been learning about the movement of the Earth's tectonic plates, what exactly causes earthquakes, and the devastating effects of natural disasters.

The children have engages in some excellent learning across the curriculum and their efforts have been very much appreciated.
